You may wonder how a 4-year-old blind child can do her own Christmas shopping for Mom and Dad, but for Christy, shopping has become a familiar skill. Only the decision making was what made this special shopping excursion so difficult.

Christy has been a student at the Little Light House for several years, but recently she has been attending school not only in the Little Light House facility, but also in the community. With a trained volunteer she has had opportunities to explore and experience parts of the community that other children learn about so easily from a distance. In the past months, Christy has been exploring various kinds of stores, their content, their organization, and how to master their escalators and automatic doors. For these reasons it seemed appropriate that this Christmas, Christy used these new skills to purchase Christmas gifts for Mom and Dad. And so, Christy tackled those automatic doors again and entered a large department store to do her own Christmas shopping.

Inside the department store, Christy knew that the aisles were organized according to

the different kinds of items on the shelves. On previous visits, she had spent hours exploring the various categories of items. She knew that some shelves held things that mommies

used, some held things that daddies used, and of course some held toys that she might enjoy. This led Christy to know full well that all department stores must also have a section entitled "presents". After all, was that not what she had come to buy? It took some time before Christy would accept the fact that "presents" do not begin in their wrapped state, but this only made the trip more interesting. There were so many things that needed to be felt, listened to, and smelled before the proper presents could be chosen. Soon Christy smelled like a myriad of men's colognes. She also had "tested" pairs upon pairs of men's gloves. She explored the toys and the shoes and eventually found just the right gifts for Mom and Dad. At the close of the day Christy experienced the pleasure of turning purchases into presents as she helped wrap the packages and put them under the Christmas tree.

We believe that Christy will remember this year as a very special Christmas. For the staff of the Little Light House, it is already a special Christmas, and Christy's new independence and progress has been a very special gift.

2021 Gift of Hope

August 2016, my life changed forever when I found out that I was pregnant with my mustard seed, Alyssa.

In September, I received the news that my first ultrasound would send me to a high-risk doctor due to measurement concerns. At the high-risk doctor, I heard the words, "Don't keep your hopes up; she could be still-born." I remember leaving that appointment and sitting in my car crying, worrying, and just sad. That moment, I remembered the Bible verse Matthew 17:20, "Because you have so little faith. Truly I tell you, if you have faith as small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there,' and it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you." I decided to pick myself up and declare a different outcome for my mustard seed. I went to appointments twice a week until the day she arrived.

My mustard seed was born on February 22, 2017, at 37 weeks and four days. She was a full-term baby but only weighed 3lbs 10oz and measured 15 1/2 inches long. We spent 21 days in the NICU, and after countless appointments, my child was still not gaining weight; so, a specialist recommended genetic testing.

A month before her 1st birthday, we received the news that our mustard seed had Russell-Silver syndrome (RSS). RSS is a rare disorder that is characterized by intrauterine growth restriction. Alyssa is 1 in 100,000. She is our lottery ticket. I wanted nothing more than for my child to be "normal," if that even exists. We got a diagnosis: my lottery ticket, 1 in 100,000, and tiny mustard seed were moving a mountain in me! As I embraced that concept, I felt more at peace and realized I was chosen to be Alyssa's mom.

One day, I met a mother who pointed me to the Little Light House (LLH). This mother quickly became a friend, and I will forever be grateful for God putting it on her heart to share LLH with me. I scheduled a time to tour LLH, and after that tour, I put Alyssa on the waiting list. The moment I walked into Little Light House, *I felt at home*. I knew I was in a unique and special place.

As we walked through a new diagnosis of Type 1 Diabetes with Alyssa, we felt lighter being surrounded by such a remarkable community at LLH.

Little Light House is a place of *hope*, *joy*, and community. I cannot put into words the support we've received the last couple of years - from the teachers, administrative staff, and other parents. LLH provides a space of hope and I never want to leave this place. I found a village here at LLH and I know that any adversity will be met with a village standing behind and beside me. This village includes individuals like you, who read this letter written by a mom trying to explain how grateful we are when words will never be enough. Without you, I wouldn't be able to afford the education and therapy that we receive here. Without you, there would be less hope in our world. I am forever grateful for a community that gives its time, talents, money, and influence to the students at LLH.

You allow Little Light House families, like ours, to succeed and grow. You give us hope.
