## **Executive Director**

"Enlarge the place of your tent, and let the curtains of your habitations be stretched out; do not hold back; lengthen your cords and strengthen your stakes." Isaiah 54:2



The Lord brought this verse to my attention a few years ago while I was praying about the future of Little Light House. Since then, it has served as a beacon, guiding us along the shores of God's love as we lengthen the cords of our facility in our community and around the world.

As we look to the future, one truth keeps looking back at us: the world *needs our services.* The more individuals, families, organizations, and communities we meet, the more obvious this need becomes. National and state statistics reveal the need as well, indicating that approximately 10,000 children under the age of six in Tulsa County are considered to have some form of disability. The UN reports that people with disabilities represent a disproportionate percentage of people living in poverty. These individuals form the world's largest minority numbering one billion. According to UNICEF, 240 million of these are children.

It is difficult to comprehend this staggering number of people in need or to know where to begin in helping them. Yet I continue to find comfort in our Father who sees each of these, His children. He desires for them to know and experience the abundant life that He offers. We believe God has uniquely equipped Little Light House to serve these children and their families through training techniques incorporating educational and therapeutic excellence. For 50 years we have been pursuing best practices in serving children with special needs. And we have so much to offer! With God's help and your help, we can improve the quality of these children's lives, and those of their families and communities.

I pray these stories from Kenya encourage you to trust that God is working to meet the needs of His children around the world. I also hope they motivate you to engage in this need. 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## KENYA 2022

In January 2022, a team of five staff members from Little Light House left for a 14 day trip to Kenya. This trip included a two-day teachers' conference in Kisumu; meetings and celebrations in four villages with various

church, family, and community members; the dedication of new buildings at SeedPower-Oyugis, and a new water system for SeedPower-Nyakach, and classroom visits at both campuses.

Through the conference and throughout the trip, the team met with government officials and community leaders at multiple levels, including the village chiefs, county directors, directors of government departments, and members of the governor's office including the Deputy Governor and the Governor of Kisumu County. They also had the opportunity to meet with many leaders in the education sector, including university and government directors, deans, professors, and program administrators. In the future, LLH hopes to partner with Maseno University on projects related to primary and special education. *At least 1,134 people were directly touched.* 



"This trip was the best mix of politics, education, and Christianity I have experienced. At all the village celebrations, I marveled at the older women's enthusiasm and dancing. Why were they so happy? I realized later it was in response to the change in the trajectory of life for the village they had been raised in and raised their families in. At the teachers' conference in Kisumu, our team presented on multiple topics relating to children with special needs, and they were well-received by everyone. Prior to the conference, pre-primary teachers were the lowest paid of all teachers and not well respected. The conference helped champion the importance of these teachers' role in a child's development. Since then, teachers have been implementing the information and techniques from the conference, contributing to:

- Children with special needs gaining more acceptance in classrooms and communities.
- Pre-primary teachers being recognized on the same level as other teachers, gaining a salary and a pension and increasing their annual income in most counties.
- Families of children in early childhood education programs no longer having to pay school fees in Nyandarua County, opening education to all children, pre-k to 3rd grade.

Little Light House's (LLH) visit has impacted Kenya in a big way. Most people in our communities are now accepting of children with special needs and do not consider their condition a curse. Teachers and caretakers in early childhood education in Kenya have improved their skills on how to work with children with special needs; are able to identify them in their schools, classrooms, and communities; and are equipped with ideas, skills and strategies to help them keep up with life as they grow and develop. The conference helped advocate for children with special needs, and the LLH Team helped everyone they met understand that these children are not a curse for their families, they are made in the image of God and for his glory to be manifested.

Those who attended the conference learned activities to apply at school and at home to help children with special needs develop. Teachers who attended the conference have shared that they are using different behavior management tools they learned, and these skills are helping them understand their students better and establish good relationships with them to help them learn. At SeedPower, we are using locally available materials to help implement fine motor and communication activities, and it is helping our teachers consider the individual needs of all their learners as they prepare and deliver hands-

on lessons. We are also applying the strategies of involving parents and caregivers in helping their children learn and succeed in their daily life.

We strongly believe that LLH, through the Global Impact program in partnership with SeedPower, will continue to have more international conferences so that our teachers and caregivers in Kenya and other neighboring countries may acquire more best practice tools, strategies and therapeutic skills to improve each child's development on how to effectively help learners with special needs.



#### **Changing the Trajectory of Lives in Oyugis and Nyakach**

After the teachers' conference, the LLH team spent most of their time in Oyugis and Nyakach, where SeedPower Education Center has opened two early childhood centers for vulnerable children including those with special needs who would not otherwise have access to education. Each school location now has a water well, providing these villages with clean water for the first time EVER. The Chief of Nyakach said that the village now has the two things necessary for life: clean water and school. Children with special needs that had been hidden are being brought into the light of the community and are being enrolled in school. SeedPower Education Center and the two villages they are located in are now being seen as models for Kenya and the countries they border.

At Nyakach SeedPower, the Little Light House was given a goat. Yes, a goat. SeedPower will take care of the goat for us, using the milk for the children, and the future kids (baby goats) will be used to bless the community.

# A light is dawning in these villages.

#### NEW CONNECTIONS AND PROGRAMS

A new joint venture is being devloped between SeedPower, the Little Light House, and Nyalenda Young Turks to start a program for the children with special needs, their families, caregivers, and siblings, living in the Nyalenda slums,.

Many community leaders have requested that the Little Light House return soon to provide more training in the realm of children with special needs.



# NXALENDA SLUMS

The Nyalenda Slums sit south of Kisumu's wealthy city center, and its residents live in extreme poverty with very little resources, food, and access to education.

These families are in dire need of basic necessities. Mothers, aunts, grandparents, and siblings are abandoned by their family, cut off from their communities, and left to fend for themselves and their children with special needs **because their child is believed to be a curse.** 

Victor Omondi and his team members at Nyalenda Young Turks, have spent years building relationships with the residents of Nyalenda, and they play an active role in mobilizing help and resources for these families. During an afternoon visit, the Little Light House team offered what resources they could, wept with these families, and overall left feeling like they hadn't even scratched the surface of meeting the extreme needs of the community.


While they came home, Victor and his team continued to fight for, train, and equip these caretakers using tools they learned from the team and all of the compassion in their hearts. 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
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
