The LLH staff is refining the new Early Intervention program, and the pilot program began in September.

Another big change is on the horizon as well. Our Executive Director, Jean Winfrey, will be retiring in July of 2019. Jean has faithfully served the Little Light House ministry for 40+ years, leading as Executive Director for the last ten years. Her time at the Little Light House has reinforced the culture of excellence in all things, hospitality to all who enter our doors, and above all bringing glory to our Lord by walking in His leading. She will be able to spend more time with all those grandchildren she and Keith have been blessed with; and give Keith a little more attention!

The Lord has always provided the leadership that was necessary for the work that needed to be accomplished in each season. Marcia Mitchell brought vision and a faithfulness to creating a God centered and God honoring foundation. That foundation, now well documented, will hold true as future generations of leadership are faithful to stand on it. Jean has taken the ministry to a new level of organizational professionalism. She gracefully wore the responsibility of overseeing the capital campaigns, expansion of our facilities and renovation of the lovingly well used one. Under her watch we will begin implementation of the Early Intervention program. We know that the Lord's mantle rested on both of these extraordinary women, and that He perfectly equipped them for the work they were called to. We believe the Lord's grace and provision will also be on the next executive director.

The process of identifying the next executive director began in April of 2017. Research was done on other nonprofit organizations that had undergone successful succession. There was a diligent review of best practices

for the identification of talent and their development. This will benefit the Little Light House now as well as in the future, as we identify those within the ministry and develop them for future leadership.

As seems true with all endeavors of the ministry the Lord had a plan and the provision to carry it out. The ED search committee was introduced to Sarah Brock PhD. She is the head of talent assessment and development for the nationally known Johnson & Johnson. She recommended we speak with Captain Matt McCord with the Tulsa police department responsible for training. Matt now serves on our LLH board and brings important insight into the HR world. Sarah also introduced us to Reliant Talent Management and Development Solutions. Chris

Wright PhD, founder and president of Reliant, along with Katie Packell PhD, head of consulting services at Reliant, came on board with their expertise and services. God literally brought the Power Team of HR to the LLH!

This team came along side the board and committee to walk out this process with us. They initially helped the board identify and articulate the characteristics and competencies needed in the next ED. They developed specific tools, based on our criteria, to allow us to

objectively assess candidates for the position. They spent countless hours developing, meeting, interviewing and assessing, so we might have the very best moving forward. I personally can not begin to thank them enough for all they have generously given to the LLH ministry. My prayer is the Lord will bless them richly for the blessing they have been to us.

The standards for leadership are established in God's word. 1 Timothy 3 out lines the characteristics He desires in those chosen to shepherd. They must be above reproach, use self-control, sober minded, respectable, hospitable, able to teach, gentle, and manage their household well. In 1 Samuel 16:7, the Lord cautioned Samuel as he examined Jessie's seven, seemingly well qualified, sons, "Do not look on his outward appearance, for I look on the heart." By the final interview it became evident that one

The Little Light House is blessed to have on our staff two outstanding members, Sherry Gurney (on the right) and Lynda Crouch (on the left), who are certified low vision therapists holding endorsements for the Perkins-Roman CVI Range.



The Perkins-Roman endorsment is a particular tool for assessing Cortical Vision Impairment with a specific purpose. This purpose is to determine the degree of impact or extent of effect of CVI. There are no other therapists in Oklahoma with this training and achieving this endorsement is no small task. Hours and hours of study. testing and clinical experience are mandated prior to sitting for the endorsement exam.

So what then is Cortical Vision Impairment (CVI)? It is a neurological condition where the brain has difficulty interpreting the information received from the eyes. A child may appear as if not looking at toys or faces and often looks away. Sometimes this is interpreted that they are not interested in or do not like a toy. The child may have difficulty looking at objects that have busy visual backgrounds, or may prefer certain colors: e.g. red or yellow. Their eye doctor may say there is nothing wrong with the eye itself but parents may still feel that their child is not focusing on objects, looks away to reach for objects, or needs light and movement of objects to "see" them.

At Little Light House, you will see these two women working with our children to identify who would benefit from this additional assessment and development of a vision therapy program specifically designed for the individual child. Specialized equipment, lights, colors, textures and positioning devices are used to maximally stimulate the child's vision and to participate in the Bible story being taught in the classroom. We also offer an alternative Praise and Worship experience each week providing a darkened and guiet environment to stimulate vision experiences while utilizing soft, calming music. This allows children with CVI to participate in praising Him for all of His blessings. The guiet environment helps the children "turn on" their vision when fewer environmental influences are competing in their little bodies.

We are truly blessed that the Lord has raised Sherry and Lynda to complete this training and help our children shine their lights brightly for Him by helping them learn to "see" Him in the best possible way.

## **JOSHUA DAVID MERRITT ROBINSON**

Joshua is an amazing little boy who had a rough start to life. He was born by way of an emergency c-section 4 weeks before his due date and came into the world limp and lifeless. It was 8 minutes before he showed signs of life. Joshua then spent 5 weeks in PICU.

## From the beginning Joshua has been a fighter.

My husband and I had the great fortune of meeting Joshua at 4 months old. You see we were "just" fostering at the time, but Joshua changed all that. With 7 adult children and 6 grandchildren we really hadn't intended to start over, but God knew just what we needed, and we wouldn't change it for the world.

Joshua's big sister Abby had gone back to school for a nursing degree that took her to some interesting places, one of which was a school for children with Cerebral Palsy in Missouri. After her visit there, she shared her experiences with us and it sparked my memory that we had an amazing school like that in Tulsa. So, I made a phone call and scheduled a visit to Little Light House. I had always known about this ministry, but didn't have any idea what a magical place it was. To say the least my husband and I were touched deeply by this amazing place, and were so excited to get on the waiting list at number 155. At the time we were still just foster parents, but we knew we would do all we could for this amazing little guy.

At this time Joshua was two years old, and we really didn't know what we were in for. We had no experience with special needs children and Joshua had seemed like such a typical baby, but as he aged he wasn't reaching "normal" milestones, such as crawling, talking and even eating well. One of the biggest helps in those early waiting list days was the FLIP program at LLH. We found common ground, community, help and education here. We made life long friends from just attending once a month. The comfort and familiarity that both Joshua and us obtained by those regular visits are invaluable.

The wait to be at Little Light House seemed to go on forever, but we knew in the summer of 2017 his time had come. At the time, we lived outside of Tulsa on a small ranch. When we prayed about the best path for the next two years, we felt it was time to sell the ranch and move into Tulsa to be closer to Joshua's amazing school. Because of this move we have been able to be more involved with Little Light House and have expanded our already supportive family, to the friends we have gained through this ministry.

In June of 2018 we made a memorable trip to St. Louis Children's Hospital where Dr. Park performed a Selective Dorsal Rhizotomy on our precious boy. This procedure frees the spasticity from his lower extremities and frees him from the need for medications. We are so excited with the results and continue to see a lot of little milstones as we attended 8 therapies a week.

Joshua is an amazing little boy with the will to learn and do. He loves to watch Veggies Tales, swim and hang out with his friends at the Little Light House. He has wonderful nieces and nephews that keep him laughing and playing. He loves to play his peek a boo games on the ipad and he is so very smart. He has made great progress in his ability to sit independently, and use his hands for play and food. He is pretty vocal, not verbal yet, but we know he will be. The progress he has made with his communication and other milestones he has hit at Little Light House is amazing. We are so excited to continue to see him grow and learn.

Along with his love for sports and staying active, Tim is a seasoned traveler. He has even fulfilled his lifelong dream of going to Hawaii – three times so far! He has visited the Sequoias of California, beaches on both coasts, been all over both the Rockies and the eastern part of the US. He also went to Mexico with his mom and brothers. His favorite vacation spot is Big Cedar Lodge, when he can get an invitation, because he loves the outdoors. Recently, he spent a weekend riding horses with a niece in Wisconsin.

## **Non-discriminatory Policy**

The Little Light House, Inc is a non-profit Christian Developmental Center for children with disabilities, age birth to six years of age. The Little Light House does not discriminate on the basis of religion, sex, color, race, national or ethnic origin, or medical diagnosis (unless the diagnosis affects the child's ability to attend school on a regular basis) in the administration of its educational policies, admission policies, and other school administered programs. Some behavioral conditions may be evaluated on individual basis. The Little Light House assures that all children's records will be maintained as confidential.
