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STUDENT SPOTLIGHT:

TYTAN STONE

H! My name is Tytan Josiah Stone and I am going to tell you a story about me. About June of 2012, my mommy had an ultrasound while I was growing inside “the oven” and she received a scary report from the doctor. The test indicated my head was unusually large and he was not sure what happened to me. More tests were done and my mommy was freaking out as no one could diagnose the problem. About three weeks later, I was so uncomfortable, that I caused a lot of stress and insisted to come out and see the world even though I should have waited six more weeks. I’ll let my mommy, Meredith, tell you more of the story.

The next few hours were the longest hours of my life. I was lying on an operating table from an emergency C-section, able to see six doctors huddling over Tytan and then they rushed him off to another area. My mother was able to observe everything from a distance and still stay with Tytan. Whisked next to the

NICU, Tytan was hooked up to several machines and immediately had a transfusion of platelets.

The diagnosis was vague as the doctors still were baffled and knew there were other abnormalities and that I needed to see a specialist. The preliminary issues were Hydrocephaly and Dandi Walker Syndrome. The only neonatal/ surgeon was in St. Louis or Oklahoma City. So, within two hours, baby Tytan was life-flighted to the OU Children’s Medical Hospital. Dr. Grosse was amazing. A thorough neurological exam revealed Tytan had a stroke intrauterine, which the doctor was familiar with but had never actually seen one during her career. She shared with me the need to operate as soon as Tytan’s temperature could be brought up to normal. We put him in very warm clothes and kept him in a warming bed along with all tubes to keep him alive.

Dr. Grosse did a procedure to remove the dried-up blood and the dead brain cells from his little head. Tytan was left with 7% of the right side and 32% of the left side of his brain. Of course, I

was devastated. I had two daughters earlier in life and was so thrilled to have a son, but a mom is never prepared for a “special” baby. We stayed at OU Children’s Medical Hospital for several weeks until Dr. Grosse could operate again to place a shunt in his head. Other medical issues surfaced after the surgery, including the fact he might not be able to see. Over time and several ophthalmologist visits, it was stated he was legally blind, but today he is able to see with a challenge of Cortical Vision Impairment.

We continued to travel back-and-forth to Oklahoma City five more times to keep updating the shunt, until it worked properly. To this day, if Tytan ever seems to be ill, the x-rays and c-scans are done to make sure the shunt is working. Unfortunately, Tytan has developed PTSD with doctors or anyone in a white coat! The good news is Tytan’s head circumference began to shrink and he could finally hold his head up when he was eight months old. It really took extra time for him to reach his milestones and we nick-named him Tytan Turtle. Everyone, especially other little kiddos loved Tytan Turtle!

An exciting day came when Tytan was enrolled at the Little Light House (LLH). The opportunities for him to grow and mature were amazing. He was able to receive all the “therapists’ specialties:” speech therapy, low-vision therapy, physical and occupational therapies. Each LLH student receives an individualized educational plan with a goal for the child to function as independently as possible, considering their mental and physical challenges, although no limits are put on progress.

Every student is held up in prayer and we see miracles every day. The entire LLH staff collaborates all their energies for the students. When you walk through the halls to take your little one to their class, you can feel the positive and spiritual-energy flowing in the hallways and classrooms. The love exudes from everyone and every child who is blessed to attend receives the most special attention available in the world.

Tytan loves to go to school. His vocabulary grows weekly and his words are appropriate for the situation. He is working on fine-motor skills and participating in crafts, problem-solving situations and learning to play with other children. He adores music and sings in tune with all types of musical genre.

Having a child with special needs and being a single mom takes a “village” to handle the diverse needs every day, twenty-four seven!! I am fortunate to have my two daughters, my mom and dad, and friends to help. Sadly, Tytan’s father, Freddie, died two years ago in a drowning accident and his loss has left a void impossible to fill. Freddie’s dad and mom are pastors of a church in Vian, Oklahoma and they are a wonderful family with lots of kids and grandchildren who adore Tytan. They usually have Tytan visit for a week or so at a time.

At home the everyday events with Tytan are sometimes comical, sometimes very “un-nerving” and stressful, and sometimes very hard. He is close to walking on his own but crawls around very fast. He loves to throw clothes and toys into the ceiling fan so now he has an adjustable basketball goal (in the living room) and has learned how to shoot from his knees! He loves to sing, loves to play notes on a piano, and loves to crawl in

the dryer and then play “Where’s Tytan?”. Peek-a-boo is also still his favorite game. In so many ways, he is still our five-year old baby and our Tytan Turtle.

Tytan’s development and future is certainly in God’s hands. We all have witnessed that God has rewired his brain to see him grow and learn as he has. There is no way to predict or even imagine how he will progress, but it is something new every day. We are blessed and honored to have Tytan in our lives.

A Year in Review: 2016 - 2017 Highlights

LAMP Center of Excellence: The Little Light House is the first educational organization in Oklahoma to be recognized as a LAMP Center of Excellence by the Center for AAC and Autism. LAMP stands for Language Acquisition through Motor Planning and it is a communication device and therapeutic approach used to improve language and communication skills in individuals who are non-verbal. We are excited to use this approach with our students to give each child a "voice."

Tracking Progress: Did you know our therapy team created a tool to help evaluate the progress of our students? It is called the Student Growth Indicator (SGI) and it tracks each child's progress in goal completion on 14 various developmental categories at the middle and end of each year. At these times, parents receive a Student Growth Report, which provides a snapshot of their child's success over each semester. This tool focuses on the child's capabilities, not their disability.

Children's Storybooks: This year, the Little Light House was pleased to receive a special grant from Anthem Church to convert our children's stories, which are part of our Bible-based curriculum, **Head to Toe, Heart and Soul**, into paperback children's books. Each book includes a few options of activities that correspond with the story providing caregivers a fun way to engage their child in the story. These are available in the LLH Gift Shop while supplies last, but can also be purchased online through Amazon.com. (Remember, if you use Smile.Amazon.com, you can select the LLH as your charity of choice and Amazon will donate a portion of every dollar spent to the LLH).

with Elle McCullough

This verse immediately came to my mind when the staff at the Little Light House asked me to pick one for my daughter, Elle McCullough, when she started school in 2011. I remind Elle almost every day that she is special and wonderful and perfect - even though she doesn't walk or look or think like others her age.

The Little Light House was just as much a life-changer for Elle as it was for me and my husband. We saw others dealing with the struggles and heartache and found comfort in other parents and staff. Elle could not walk or crawl when we began at LLH - and she WALKED out of graduation! She was more confident, had begun to write and was enjoying being around others!

Elle was born with two congenital heart defects (Tetralogy of Fallot and Pulmonary Atresia), Scoliosis, a neck problem and some brain damage from loss of oxygen. It has been a long road and will continue to be... but places like the LLH remind us we can do it - and that we are WONDERFULLY MADE!

Since Elle graduated in 2013, it has been tough. We would have stayed forever had they let us! But we FINALLY found a wonderful school for her in Town & Country. It took many tries to find a place where she would thrive. Lots of tears were shed, many tests were taken and many heartbreaks and setbacks occurred. But finally she has begun to read and spell - and is

even doing some drama at her new school!

We are so grateful. Last summer Elle had her second open heart surgery and is doing better - she is energetic and even sassier (if that's even possible)! She's been through

seven heart catheterizations, hours and hours of physical therapy, speech therapy, doctor after doctor - but I am amazed at her progress... And it all started at the Little Light House.

We will forever be grateful for this place of safety and comfort and strength. And may we always remember we ALL are wonderfully made!

the light of the world is jesus

A favorite time of the year for our family is Christmas. When my husband and I lived in Kenya, we had Christmas in July, because it was winter there! Christmas in our home has always been filled with smells of cooking, candles and Christmas lights. Now you may understand why it comes naturally to me to use lights in my work with the little ones with compromised vision. Lights bring life to their world too! When lights (vision), plus sound, touch, smell and taste are paired in an experience, it is retained in visual memory.

To meet the need of lighted sensory tables, we asked two wonderful Scouts, looking for projects, to build them for us. A light-sensory table is a lighted box, set into a child-sized table, which back-lights the items in the bin. The children's attention is focused for lengthier periods of time and the flow of the lights adds a new element to toys, shapes, and details in nature.

When a sturdy frosted piece of plastic is placed over the top of the lighted bin, a whole new experience unfolds! Arts, crafts,

and educational concept building are enhanced by the addition of "back-lighting." A soothing calm in this quiet play setting also has the benefit of settling the children down, much like sitting in front of a warm fire in the fireplace at Christmas.

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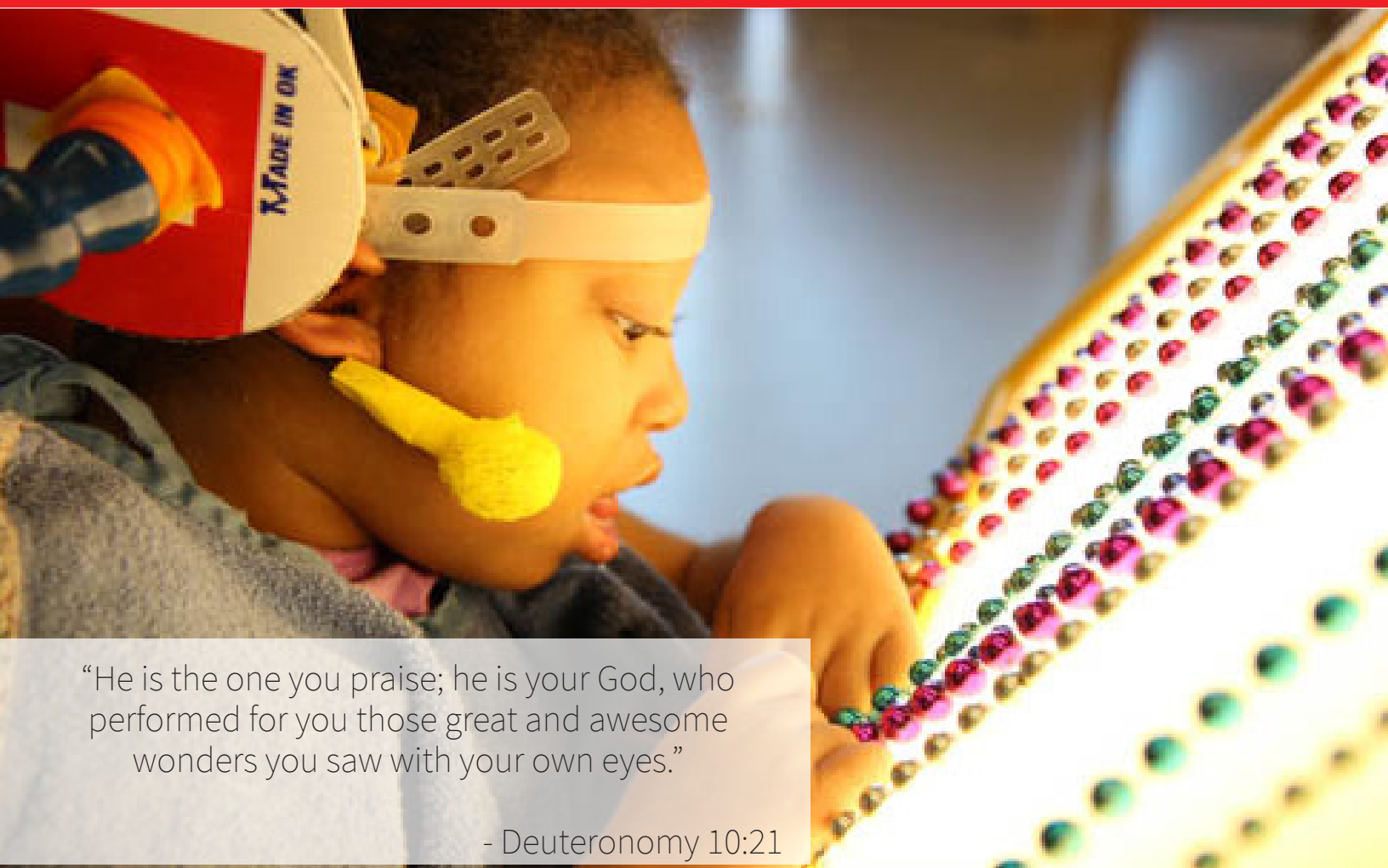
