SO MANY NEW THINGS TO COME IN THIS NEW YEAR

It is hard to believe 2019 has arrived! With this New Year, we have a lot of "new" that is happening around the Little Light House. First, I am delighted to share with you that we have just completed the renovation of our original building. I would like to invite you to a comeand-go open house of our new Family Learning Center on February 14 at 10am to 1pm. With an additional 20,000 sq. ft. we will be able to serve more families than ever before! As we have been moving furniture and equipment in this month, I have been overwhelmed with how blessed we are to have such a beautiful space to serve our children and their families.

Second, many of you are aware we embarked in a pilot program this past semester for a new Early Intervention program we will start in the Family Learning Center. We received wonderful feedback from the parents who participated with their precious little ones. This program will provide a way for us to serve those who are on our very long waiting list, which is now over 275 children. With the expansion of our building and the dream of a program, we know we need to increase our budget to support these new services. We will slowly grow into our new Family Learning Center as our operating budget increases to meet the need. God has always shown himself faithful, and he has always met our needs as we have continued to expand our services over the years.

In addition, a new Executive Director will be taking the lead come July 1. Anne McCoy was introduced to you in our last Beacon and has already been immersed in many training opportunities. Starting this month, I will have Anne by my side full-time so that I can transfer all that I know and do into her hands. I hope sometime in the next six months you will come by to meet her as I pass the baton. As I prepare to leave, I'm blessed and excited because I know that I have completed the purpose God had for me to fulfill here.

Lastly, a huge thank you to all of our constituents for staying the course with us. As I was recently reflecting over our list of donors, I saw many familiar names that have been supporters for three and four decades, and others not quite so long. In addition, I was also in awe of the many new "first time" donors that are coming along side what we are doing. 2018 was a very good year, and we are so grateful for your support. We know we could not have done it without you! However, we are also very excited about all the "new" that will be happening in the coming year and hope you will continue with us!

STUDENT SPOTLIGHT GRETCHEN NOVAK BY SEAN AND ANGIE NOVAK

Joy is defined as the feeling of great happiness. We call Gretchen our joy ambassador. She is a happy, carefree child of God, who loves to smile and interact with others. She is a beautiful little girl with so much heart for those around her.

Gretchen was due April 19th, but on April 17th we learned she was breech and although we attempted to turn her, she was over 9 pounds and was not budging. She was born via c-section on April 24, 2013 at St. Francis Hospital in Tulsa, OK and was visually healthy-looking. Those moments hearing her first cry and seeing her sweet face were perfect. She is a true gift from God.

When Gretchen was 7 months old, she went to a vision follow-up. The doctor we saw was not seeing Gretchen respond visually in a typical way. He told us she was legally blind, and encouraged us to reach out to our resources. Our Sooner Start coordinator, Sarah Tronnier, adamantly made clear to us she would bring us to LLH for a tour and that Gretchen needed to be enrolled on the waiting list. Through Little Light House we were albinism, and we felt a relief that Gretchen might have the opportunity to develop in a nurturing place where every child has a different starting point and story to tell. We were encouraged that even though we could not predict of, that Little Light House would support her to become her best self. It seemed clear that whatever resources might help a child grow and thrive are sought out in this place. Gretchen was put on the waiting list on November 2013 at number 149. As we waited patiently and eagerly for Gretchen to get into Little Light House, we also were waiting for more answers about Gretchen's diagnosis. Our initial struggles were with blindness, low muscle

tone, mobility, as well as eating and drinking difficulties. All the hopes and dreams we had while pregnant had evolved as parents to adjust to what Gretchen needed us to be, in addition to what her older brothers needed. We had become accustomed to doctors and medical professionals being baffled by Gretchen. She was known as a "mystery" baby in the NICU. Every test came back negative with no answers. The hospital geneticist told us moment, when we realized not every child leaves the hospital with answers. We became used to not knowing what we were dealing with, and at some point the the human detail of a diagnosis fell to the wayside and we poured our whole hearts into just caring for her the best we knew how. As we reflect, we realize now how crucial it is not to get hung up emotionally on the impact a diagnosis can bring. Repeatedly, we were told what we might be dealing with and all those conclusions were wrong. Had we not continued to trust God with His design and plan, we probably would have succumbed to the false diagnoses we were often given and lost hope; but God has a mighty plan for children like Gretchen.

The year 2016 was a year of answered questions and the end to a lot of waiting. On March 22, 2016 Gretchen got the call that she would be eligible to start at LLH in August of that year. Just shortly after this phone call, our geneticist recommended another test, a whole sequencing, and more waiting delivered an elusive answer for Gretchen's diagnosis. We sent off our blood tests on May 5, 2016 and on September 27, 2016, we received a call informing us that Gretchen has a rare genetic disorder called PURA Syndrome. It was God's timing on the phone call because Gretchen was at therapy and her primary therapist was able to help Angie process the information with genetics on the phone. There was an immediate circle of other parents, relationships we had formed in the hours spent in waiting rooms. Going online immediately opened a whole new support group of other parents of children with PURA syndrome. Sometimes the wait, which is so hard to deal with, is so important in reaching the answers we hope for. The first night of our diagnosis was full of relief, reading the list of symptoms was confirming, and feeling the impact of a "welcome" globally was encouraging that all this time we were not alone in the journey with Gretchen.

The very next day, when Angie took Gretchen to Little Light House, we saw so clearly that God was preparing this whole time to support us. Out of only 60+ documented cases worldwide, another student in her class had the same diagnosis. The world is tiny folks! Out of the whole world, Gretchen had been in the same country, state, county, city, school, and classroom with another PURA kiddo and that connection has grown into a family friendship God knew we needed for this journey.

Gretchen will have attended Little Light House for three years when she graduates summer of 2019. Amongst her time here we have seen so many milestones and miracles. When she started at age 3, she was not even crawling yet! Gretchen can now crawl and walk, which has transitioned over the years from highly confined to a walker then to a gait trainer to walking sometimes holding someone's hand or all by herself. She can see, keep eye contact for longer periods, hear, clap, laugh, and smile as a response to interaction with people and her environment. She can feed herself with her hands and often with utensils. She can drink from a cup and from a straw. She plays with others, explores her surroundings, and goes potty on the toilet. Her receptive vocabulary is great. She understands what a talker is and is acquiring communication skills on her adaptive device. She can understand how to be around kids, people, and animals like dogs and rabbits. Her whole world has been transformed like a fog slowly lifting.



We want anyone who donates to the Little Light House to understand their impact has no end. We will always be thanking Little Light House for the level of care, instruction and therapy Gretchen has received. As parents we planned for Gretchen, but we never could have expected her to be the mystery and special unicorn she is. For that we are financially so grateful for you all and the opportunity she has had to grow and learn at Little Light House. We have had the ability to focus on her medical needs financially, knowing she has her academic and group therapy needs met at school. Many families like ours have multiple children and having access to Little Light House, regardless of income, provides for the whole family to be cared for. We are thankful for the close attention Gretchen has received and we know first-hand that she will be more successful for her next school experience because the impact donors have made in creating an amazing school.

When we told our son he was possibly having a little sister, he said "Oh I know, it's a girl and her name is Kylie Jordan!" He was 3 years old and could not wait to be a big brother.

After having a normal pregnancy and birth, we brought our baby girl home. Within the first few days, which turned into weeks, of constant crying we spoke to our pediatrician. She said it was probably just colic and every baby is different... to give it time. However, we weren't

rookie parents. We knew something wasn't right. Kylie would not look at you while feeding and she cried almost 24 hours a day. We were unaware of any medical issues until she began having seizures at the age of 5 months. We were then thrust onto the roller coaster we call life.

The pediatrician immediately referred us to a local neurologist and the investigation began. After 6 months of going down several different paths the decision was made to refer Kylie to Columbia Presbyterian in NYC for a fresh muscle biopsy and a lumbar puncture. Kylie was diagnosed with a rare mitochondrial metabolic disorder causing infantile spasms, cortical visual impairment, and cerebral palsy. It felt like a death. Sad, scared and hopeless were some of our initial emotions; however, somehow the Lord always steps in just when you don't think you can take anymore. We put our faith in the Lord and our lives have never been the same. She started the Ketogenic diet and her seizures slowed, then eventually stopped.

At the suggestion of our case manager from Sooner Start, we called the Little Light House. We took a tour as soon as possible, put Kylie on the waiting list ,and began praying it would not take the two years they had estimated. Ironically, Kylie enrolled one month shy of two years...she started in the yellow class as a 3-year old, and this was the beginning of the things she would "start" while there!! She started sitting up, putting her feet on the ground to stand, signing "Hi" when greeting people, and dancing to music during praise and worship. So many "milestones and miracles" there isn't time to write about them all; but the biggest thing we began to have was hope for the future. Someday Kylie will be able to select her own life verse; but until then, we have selected 1 Corinthians 13:7 Love always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.

Graduation day came all too quickly! Kylie started Kindergarten in 2009 at our neighborhood school. We soon learned how spoiled we were by the Little Light House. We were finding it difficult to find a school program that matched their caliber. We made the decision to move to the Jenks school district when Kylie was ready for middle school. She has settled there nicely and continues to work hard on her goals. She walks with

> the assistance of a walker but would rather hold hands with a friend and take a stroll. She uses a few signs to communicate and is working with her teacher and therapist to use an iPad. She has friends, one of which was in her class at the Little Light House. Like a typical 9th grader, her favorite

classes are physical education and music. However, one of her favorite activities every year still involves the Little Light House. She loves to participate in Laps for Little Ones. It is always a glorious day when she is able to reunite with old friends, teachers, therapists and staff; all while raising funds for the school that has had such a profound impact on her life. We are all so grateful, thankful, and blessed to have been a part of the Little Light House and have full faith Kylie will continue to be the light of Christ and one of their many ambassadors for life!

The Little Light House Family Learning Center has created an innovative curriculum to meet the needs of children birth-36 months and their families while on the waiting list. Small classes where both child and parent attend focus on one-on-one teaching with the parent as the teacher. The Little Light House early childhood specialists guide parents into meaningful interactions with their child that build developmental skills. Activities to enhance social and play skills, communication and independence were highlighted in the first session consisting of ten classes.
